Of course Mrs. Leff-Ewing's class also learned how to groove to the beat, as they used a combination of drums, shakers, and claves to create Pep Band type rhythms and drum "ditty cadences"... The Kindergartners also enjoyed learning and trying out several different drums from various parts of the world, and combined percussion parts with Mr. Ewing's other musical instruments as fellow dancers danced to some folk and Native American songs. They also experienced a

but to a Michigan based organization called "Wigs 4 Kids". On May 17, Allison went to visit her Aunt, who has a small hair salon in Winn, and was asked one more time if she was sure she wanted to cut off her long beautiful hair and she said "I do and I don't. I want to help sick kids but I might miss my hair." But she told her Aunt how long she wanted it cut and soon she had shorter hair. She looked in the mirror and had the biggest smile ever. She was very happy



and proud of her new look.

She had 12 inches cut off and now it will be sent to "Wigs 4 Kids" in Saint Claire Shores, MI. To donate hair it must be clean, dry, and put in a ponytail or braid then cut off. Minimum length needed to donate varies from each organization from 8 inches - 12 inches. Hair that has been colored or permed is not healthy enough to go through the process of becoming a wig.

According to one organization it takes about 10 ponytails to make 1 wig for a sick child. If you want to contribute to any of these organizations they all can use cash donations because many of them like Wigs 4 Kids try to get children their wigs at NO cost to the family.

Summer Session Driver's Training Scheduled

The summer Segment I Driver's Training classes will be held from June 8-12, June 15-19 and June 22-23. Classes will meet from 8:00 a.m. to 10:00 a.m. Parents must have attended a 30 minute parent meeting on June 1 at 7:00 p.m. Applications for this class were due no later than June 1. Students must be 14 years old and 8 months by the time the first class takes place. Students taking this class will be eligible for the Segment II class that will meet on Sundays for three weeks. Class will meet Oct 4, Oct 11 and Oct 18 from 4:00 p.m. - 6:00 p.m.

The fall classes will meet Sept 13-14, Sept 20-21, Sept 27-28, Oct 4-5, Oct 11-12, and Oct 18-19. Classes will meet from 6:00 p.m. to 8:00 p.m. Parents must attend a 30 minute parent meeting on September 8th at 7:00 p.m. Applications for this class are due no later than September 8th and can be picked up and returned to the High School or Superintendent's Office. Students taking this class will be eligible for the Segment II class that will meet on Sundays for three weeks. Class times will be announced during the parent meeting.

This year's fee is \$270.00 which covers both Segment I and Segment II and is due on or before the first day of class. There is now an option to pay this fee on-line. More information about this option will be discussed during the parent meeting. The fee is non-refundable after the student begins the program.

Everyday Learning - *Any time is learning time when your youngster adds math to chores, practices reading in the car, or discovers science at the playground. Whether you're at home or out and about, you can turn daily activities into learning opportunities. Try these ideas for building your child's skills in reading writing, math, science and social studies.*

There are opportunities for learning around the house, while on the go, during outdoor play, and while playing games. Practice writing a chore schedule; play the alphabet game in the car, or look for signs with different letters of the alphabet and write them down; and a trip to the grocery store can improve math skills by guessing weights of fruits and vegetables and weighing them, and then estimating or calculating the prices of groceries. Outside at play your child can still be learning by recording a census of the number of girls, boys, mailboxes or flags he or she counts along a walk, or writing in the sand or with pebbles. During fun and games, ask your child to come up with an alternate ending to his or her favorite TV show, using what if questions and then act it out, or read the newspaper after dinner and circle parts of speech, i.e. verbs, nouns, prepositions.
