#### Millage Renewal Vote Scheduled for November

The general election on November 4, 2008 taxpayers will be asked to renew the district's operating millage. This millage was originally passed in June of 1999 and renewed in June of 2004. While the majority of school funding is received from the State in the per pupil foundation allowance, to receive full funding, schools must levy 18 mills on non-homestead property in their district. Operation millage is not paid on home or farmland. Operating millage is levied on non-homestead property only.

The 18 mills that are expiring this year generated approximately \$230,091.00 for the 2007/2008 school year. In these uncertain economic times, it is imperative that the district receive these operating revenues. The state assumes that the school collects the full 18 mills of property taxes. If the operating millage were not renewed, the school district would be facing a decrease in revenue of over \$230,000.00

Please consider supporting the millage proposal in November.

When dropping children off by Mayes Elementary School, please encourage them to use the crosswalk by the front entrance. It is difficult to see students when they are cutting through the parking lot and walking in between buses. We have had some close calls in the past and hope to avoid these situations in the future. Vehicles are also prohibited from parking in the yellow Bus Loading Zone in front of the building even temporarily. This, again, presents a hazard to children, bus drivers, and other vehicles. We do appreciate those of you who follow these safety procedures.

Attention Aggies it's time once again for the "Decorate Your Yard" contest. All yards should be decorated blue and white themed. The judging will be on Friday, September 26. This is a great way for everyone to show their aggie pride and represent Beal City, and there will be a prize awarded to the best decorated yard. Good Luck to everyone!

#### Asbestos Management Plan Available for Review

Our school district has conducted an extensive asbestos survey of all of our buildings. Based on the finding of this inspection, a comprehensive management plan was drafted. We endeavor to make our schools a safe place in which students can learn. Our procedures for dealing with this problem reflect that concern. Please let us know if we can answer any questions.

# Communicable Disease and Pest Policy

In keeping with the Michigan School Head Lice Prevention and Control Policy, a section of the elementary student handbook regarding lice, states that we do not do pre-planned "all school" head lice checks. Any student with live lice may remain in school until the end of the school day. Children will be allowed to ride the school bus home. Immediate treatment at home is advised. The student will be readmitted to school after treatment and examination. If, upon examination, school personnel find no live lice on the child, the child may reenter school. Parents should remove nits daily and treat if live lice are observed. When a member of the school staff suspects a child is infested with head lice, there are specific procedures that will be followed. This policy has been approved by the Michigan Department of Community Health (MDCH) and the Michigan Department of Education (MDE). If you have any questions regarding this policy, please consult the student handbook or call the elementary office at 644-2740.

## Transportation Policy

It is the policy of Beal City Public Schools not to allow students in Pre-School, kindergarten, first, second, and third grades to be dropped off at a bus stop unless there is a parent, older sibling or caregiver visible. This includes the student's home address, as well as, group stops such as the Weidman Bait Shop and the Jordan Trailer Park. Children under fourth grade must have a parent or an identified replacement (older sibling or caregiver) present when the student is dropped off. If there is not an acceptable person in view at the stop, the student will be returned to the school where they are to be picked up before 4:00 p.m. The student will be brought into the Superintendent's Office by the bus driver and will not be allowed to leave until the sign out sheet has been signed by the caregiver who is picking them up. Bus drivers will no longer be accommodating parents by meeting them along the route. The changes in this policy will be strictly enforced as we feel it is vital for the safety of our young children that we work with each family to ensure they are not left unattended.

1st offense – written warning

2nd offense – one week loss of transportation and mandatory meeting with the Transportation Director and Principal.

3rd offense – one month loss of transportation and mandatory meeting with the Transportation Director and Principal

4th offense – loss of transportation for the remainder of the year.

Extreme emergencies may be excused. Documentation may be required. Any change in destination after school must be written on a bus pass and given to the child's teacher and/or building principal. In case of any emergency, contact the appropriate office:


# Price Changes in the Cafeteria and new

information
As the new school year approaches, new ideas and prices are being brought to the cafeteria. Many changes have taken place including an unfortunate but slight increase in the prices of food. The new prices for the 2008-2009 school year are as follows: breakfast for all students is \$1.10. Secondary lunch is \$1.70 and Elementary lunch is \$1.60. Milk for all students is \$.35. Extra entrees and ala carte items will be increasing in price, ranging from fifty cents to a dollar eighty. Each day, the students will be given a choice between two lunches, which due to state requirements must consist of three of the five necessary components: meat/meat alternate, fruit, vegetable, bread and milk. If students do not choose three of these components then it will be considered ala carte. It will be more nutritious and cost effective to purchase a lunch versus ala carte.

Thanks to a grant provided by the United Dairy Council, the cafeteria will be receiving a new stand-up milk cooler and recycling bins for the plastic milk containers we started using this past year. We are rearranging our food line to make more room and help everything flow even better. New food choices will include healthier items such as salad shakers, parfaits, 100 calorie packs, etc. which will be made available through ala carte. Our theme days will continue every month this year. September we are going to celebrate homecoming with "Aggie Pride." We hope that all students will join us for our fun theme days this year. The cafeteria staff is very excited about these changes and hopes that you and your students are too. We can't wait to welcome every one back to a newly decorated, more energy-efficient cafeteria!




