


The Aggie Approach to Social Emotional Health

Over the course of the last five years we have witnessed many changes in education, but it is in Beal City's approach to the whole student that we see the greatest impact. Five years ago, BCPS had one counselor serving the graduation, testing, social emotional, and scheduling needs of students. Today, that department has tripled in number and greatly expanded the services that they provide to our students.

While the counseling department still supports standardized testing, guiding students in class choices, coordinating Career Technical classes, and graduation audits, they do much more to support our students. Starting in elementary school, the counselors provide direct classroom instruction in social emotional skills. They use a program called Second Steps to help our youngest students learn how to control their

emotions. The teachers then support these lessons in the classroom to provide reinforcement for the students. At the secondary level, the counselors support teachers in their delivery of the SEL (socio-emotional learning) content. In 6th and 9th grade, students are exposed to an SEL curriculum called TRAILS that was produced at the University of Michigan. K-12, the counselors also use Navigate 360 to provide additional lessons for students that might be struggling in a specific area. All three of these programs teach students about growth mindset and goal setting, emotion management, empathy, kindness, and problem solving

Beal City Public Schools has also been able to add two therapy dogs to the mix, thanks to some generous donations. The elementary dog's name is Blue and can often be seen in the office or visiting students in the classroom. On the secondary level, Scout is the name of the therapy dog. Scout has a schedule that moves her around the building to various classrooms helping the students become familiar with her. Like many new tools, the therapy dogs continue to be a work in progress as our handlers, trainers, and counselors determine how and where they can have the greatest impact.

Another addition to BCPS counseling protocols has included a monthly meeting between the counseling team and the administrative team. During these meetings, administrators and counselors have the opportunity to talk through some of our biggest challenges and produce multi-team approaches to better utilize our resources to help students in crisis.

Our counseling team at BCPS consists of Sara Millerov, Staci Vessell, and Breanna Gillis. Each of the three have an area of specialization between elementary, middle, and high school, but they are not limited to their area. As many people who have sought counseling or therapy services themselves understand, the relationship is paramount. At BCPS, students have the luxury of trying a different counselor if the relationship just isn't working.

In some cases, the needs of our students may exceed what we can provide during the school day. In these cases, we coordinate services for our families. In most cases, we would invite Community Mental Health in to do an assessment of the student and the family insurance, or lack of insurance, and then they help schedule the initial intake appointment with an external counselor that fits the socio-emotional and financial needs of the family. The counseling department has also developed a relationship with 1016 Substance Abuse Counseling. This organization will come into the school and do intensive one on one counseling with students having issues with drug, alcohol, or vaping issues.

One thing that has gotten better in America, but still exists, is the feeling of there being some sort of stigma in seeking out counseling or therapy. While this is unfortunate, our counselors have recognized it and made the process extremely discrete for students. The department has placed QR codes (those funny squares that we can scan with our phones) around the building. If a student scans the code, it takes them to a short form to request a meeting. The counseling department then responds quickly to schedule the appointment at the student's convenience.

When considering topics like counseling, therapy, and social emotional learning, the work is never done. The department will remain vigilant to new trends and ideas that will help them meet students where they are and support them in a world that gets more socially complex with every new media application.

Each meal meets government nutritional guidelines and standards. Schools are required to provide a breakfast meal that supplies at least ¼ of the Recommended Dietary Allowance for protein, calcium, iron, Vitamin A, Vitamin C, and calories. Check your child's menu to see the variety of nutritious choices available at School Breakfast, or stop by to sample the food yourself!

Every morning our breakfast consists of a hot breakfast item and these cold whole grain items: uncrustable, donuts, benefit bar, fruit and milk. Students must choose a fruit and 2 grain items.
