Beal City Alumna, Emily Steffke, is an Honors College senior majoring in neuroscience in the College of Natural Science and English in the College of Arts and Letters at Michigan State University. Recently, Ms. Steffke was named a Marshall Scholar.

Steffke is from Beal City, Michigan. She is an undergraduate researcher at MSU's Institute for Quantitative Health Science and Engineering. Steffke is also the co-founder and president of Reach Outside, a service organization through which MSU students help underprivileged children in the Lansing area experience a variety of outdoor sports.

"I am deeply honored to have been granted this opportunity to leap to the forefront of international health discourse and so excited to pursue a doctorate of philosophy in oncology at Oxford," Emily stated. "It is inspiring to know that the Marshall Commission not only values my pursuits and achievements during my time at MSU, but also believes in my ability to further blossom into a leader capable of addressing some of the world's greatest health concerns.

Steffke's research focuses on genetic mechanisms of cancer immunosurveillance escape. The Marshall Commission provides support for up to 50 of the most outstanding undergraduates in the country to study at any university in the United Kingdom. Congratulations, Emily, on this prestigious honor!




Beal City Middle School Youth in Government

Just before Thanksgiving, the Beal City Youth in Government delegation participated in their yearly conference in Lansing. The MS YIG students wrote their own bills and spent a couple of months learning about the legislative process before heading to the State's Capitol.

For the first time this year, 6th grade students were able to join YIG, and the team had their largest delegation membership in the middle school program's history. Three Beal City students were honored for their achievements at the program.

Liam Fox (8th Grade) was presented an award for Outstanding Committee Chair. Two other students were recognized for writing bills that passed through both the House of Representatives and the Senate, before being signed by the program's Youth Governor. Out of nearly 300 bills submitted to the program, only about 20 received this distinction. Joey Federico (7th Grade) wrote a bill to increase funding for sports safety equipment in schools. Parker McDonald (8th grade) wrote a bill to increase the minimum age to use tobacco to 21 years old.

These 19 young people did a fantastic job representing the Beal City community, and should be watched for more great achievements to come!

We were also able to visit the Diego Rivera Courtyard. It is always a favorite. We learned a little bit about the history of Detroit and the artist as well. Then, because of the wonderful chaperones, we were able to visit different parts of the museum.
