Staci Vessel - As a counselor, Staci builds strong relationships and displays a great deal of empathy with some of our students who struggle the most. She has done a lot to enhance the level of social emotional support that we offer at Beal. Staci's grant funded positive behavior rewards system has been a big hit with kids this year.

Sara Millerov - While Sara conducts some social emotional counseling, she has a lot more on her plate.
