NATIONAL SCHOOL BUS SAFETY WEEK

National School Bus Safety Week is October 16-20, 2023 and is an active and evolving public education program. It is an excellent way for parents, students, teachers, motorists, school bus operators, school administrators, and other interested parties to join forces and address the importance of school bus safety. Designed to improve school bus safety, school districts throughout the country observe School Bus Safety Week.

New Red Light Passing Cameras Thanks to a Tribal Grant

Last spring, we applied for a tribal grant that would add cameras to the exterior of the buses. These cameras will catch cars that are running the red lights while our buses are picking up and dropping off students. That application was successful thanks to Jennifer Gluch and Terri Lambourn's hard work.

This past summer, three additional cameras were installed on each bus. The images below are actual bus camera footage from this year in which we have caught vehicles passing while our bus's reds are flashing. This incident can result in up to a \$500 fine and endangers the lives of our students who ride the bus. Similar to a traffic light, when the yellows are activated on a bus, you should slow down and stop no closer than twenty feet from the bus before the red light and stop sign are activated. As you can see below, failure to do so will be caught by our new system and turned over to proper law enforcement.


Mornings can be rushed, but it is important to make time for breakfast.
