

School Bus Safety Week October 19-23, 2020



REMEMBER:

When you see a school bus stopped with its red lights flashing, you must stop too. You stop whether the bus is oncoming or you are behind the bus.

When you see a bus with flashing amber lights, slow down and prepare to stop. The bus is preparing to stop or may already be stopped.

Stay stopped until the bus moves on, or the driver signals that it's safe for you to proceed, by turning off the flashing lights. (Some buses also have a stop sign that swings out from the bus or a digital display).

Be aware of signs, school buses, playgrounds and other things that indicate that children could be close by.

Fifth Grade Social Studies

This year in Social Studies, the fifth graders have been learning about the different Native American groups. We have learned about the early hunter-gatherers and some of the great civilizations that settled throughout the Americas. Next, we learned about the different groups that settled the United States. We learned things such as: what kinds of foods they produced, the kinds of homes they lived in, if they traded with other Native Americans, and much more. To finish off the unit, the students built a home from one of the Native American tribes that they learned about. The students did an amazing job with this project!



Cleaning Up rumors on the Wind Turbines and School Finance

We wanted to do a little wind turbine and school finance educational article for our stakeholders in this month's Aggie Express. With the wind turbine project about half complete we are hearing rumors about some folks saying that the school will be getting a lot of revenue from the wind turbines once they go online. The District did sign a Good Neighbor Easement which will pay the District a small amount each year, \$3,000, which can be used for operational costs. The \$3,000 is the only money the school will receive that we can use for day to day operations. Our operational money comes from the state at about 87% of total revenue, from Federal level at about 1% and local revenue from grants and other local revenue at 12%. Part of that 12% is the local 18 mills on non-homestead property which just reduces how much money the district receives from the state per pupil foundation allowance. As an example, in the 2019-2020 school year, we received about \$395 per pupil in 18 mill non homestead money that just lowered the \$8,111 per pupil State funding to \$7,716. In total, we received \$8,111, but, \$395 was from local non-homestead funding.

The wind turbines will certainly generate more tax dollars for the district. However, this tax money can only be used toward paying off the bonded debt the school has for the building projects it has done over the years. Wind turbine revenue is either for bonded debt obligation or sinking fund obligation funds. The district, at this time, does not have any sinking funds but does have bonded debt. Both types of obligations are voted on by our tax payers and mileages are assessed.

The district has the option of asking the taxpayers to approve a sinking fund (which are very limited in what the money can be spent on, basically repairs and technology), on top of our bonded debt. The payment on the sinking fund would not come just from the wind turbines, but also the rest of our tax payers. With our current bonds, for example, 1 mill generates about \$90,000 per year of revenue to pay down the district's debt. After the wind turbines are in service, that same 1 mill will generate about \$180,000 (in the first year) of revenue to pay down debt. The wind turbines decrease in value quickly, so, the \$180,000 becomes \$60,000 after 10 years. We are a 7 mill district so we are maxed out at 7 mills for bond debt by the state, but the taxpayers could approve a sinking fund and go above that 7 mills. But, again, it would come from the taxpayers and simply generate more revenue to do projects.

Fifth Graders Learn About Engineering

In science the fifth graders are learning about engineering. They are learning how engineers use science and math to solve problems. To better understand what an engineer can do, they virtually met with Trevor Frost, a mechanical engineering student at Kettering University. Trevor currently has an internship at ZF Cooperation. He is one of the engineers that works on the lines, fixing problems and making the machines more efficient. Trevor explained what he does at his job showing us 3D computer models of parts he worked on, answered students' questions, and took us on a tour of his workplace. The students enjoyed learning about why he wants to be an engineer and what he had to study in school to become an engineer. The students had fun observing the robots make a part as the part traveled on conveyors to the next robot. Trevor explained the process as the part moved and the robots worked. We want to thank Trevor and the ZF Cooperation for sharing with us.

Board Briefs

The following was approved at a regular board meeting on September 21, 2020:

- July payments including: General Fund payments of \$450,600.76, Payroll Account payments of \$804.71, Hot Lunch payments of \$9,493.34, Student Activity Account payments \$6,807.44, Athletic Fund payments of \$1,845.76.
- The Building, Maintenance, Grounds & Transportation committee's recommendation as follows:
 - 1. That the District connect to the Nottawa Township sanitary sewer project pending further Negotiation with the township on the monthly user fee.
 - 2. That the District pay a connection fee and not participate in the 40-year special assessment.
 - 3. That the District agrees to pay the connection fee using the .75 multiplier equaling the proposed 28.5 REU's.
 - 4. That the District understands it is required by law, to enter into an operating agreement with the township, the "Operating Agreement" is currently being negotiated and reviewed by the District's attorney.
- The 2nd reading of the Title IX NEOLA Policy as presented.
- The 1st reading of the NEOLA Policy #35-1 as presented.
- The hiring of Wendy Albrecht as a halftime custodian and halftime bus driver as presented.
- Accept Tami Wilson's resignation as a full-time bus driver and Wendy Albrecht's resignation as a halftime custodian and halftime bus driver as presented.
- Accept Dan Beckwith's resignation as the 8th Gr. Boys Basketball Coach and the Varsity Boys Track Coach as presented.
- The following coaching recommendation: Brad Antcliff Voluntary Assistant Parttime Football Coach.
- Approve the hiring of Staci Vessell to fill the one-year position as a Guidance Counselor.

You'll see Mid Michigan College on your November 3rd ballot

When you cast your vote, be informed!

Mid Michigan College is asking voters who live in the Gratiot-Isabella RESD* to decide on whether they will join Mid's in-district service area (through annexation). This initiative involves two proposals, both of which must pass for annexation to occur.

Proposal I — asks voters to become part of the College's service district.

Proposal II — seeks ratification of a taxable rate of 1.2232 mills to support the College's operating budget. This is the 2nd lowest millage rate for Michigan community colleges.

What would two yes votes mean for residents living in the GI-RESD?

The biggest change would be a 40% reduction in tuition rates for students living in this geographic area. Mid has served students from Gratiot and Isabella counties for over 50 years, but as out-district students they currently pay a significantly higher tuition rate.




Fifty Years of Service in Your Community
