## Fifth Annual Apple Pie Fundraiser Success!


This year a total 675 Dutch Apple pies were made. The support from the community was overwhelming. Each year we get even more volunteers! Thank you! Your support was again amazing.

# **Winter Clothing**

It's that time of year again! Now that colder temperatures have finally arrived, we wanted to remind parents of our "Seasonal Clothing" policy, in the Parent/Student Handbook. When the temperature is 41 – 50 degrees, coats or sweatshirts are necessary. In addition, at **40 degrees or below**, <u>coats</u>, <u>boots</u>, <u>gloves</u> and <u>hats</u> are required for ALL grades, and snowpants are recommended. If a student comes to school unprepared to go outside, he/she will receive a warning the first time, and remain on the blacktop. If cold weather clothing is forgotten more than one time, students will have to stand against the wall or serve lunch detention. At all times, best judgment in accordance with weather conditions is expected. **Remember**, it could be warm in the morning and cool off throughout the day. We do live in Michigan!! It's better to pack the extra winter gear than to be caught without it when the weather turns.

### The Beal City High School Drama Class



This classic comedy is set in the Victorian Age (the last 25-30 years of the 1800s). Come enjoy the antics of Algernon and Jack as they "Bunbury" about the countryside.

Written as satire, the play encouraged people to think about the artificial barriers that defined society and enabled a privileged life for the rich at the expense of the working class. The British Empire was at its height and occupied much of the globe, including Ireland, Wilde's homeland. The English aristocracy was dominant, snobbish and rich — far removed from the British middle class and poor.

Through the use of constant satire, Wilde made fun of and tried to change the many social customs that kept women and the poor and middle classes under the feet of the aristocracy. MANY of the lines in the play are the exact opposite of truth or custom, and they set up the comedy throughout the play.

Problems always seem to happen at the most inconvenient times. Sufficient planning and preparation, and quality tires, can make the difference between a minor inconvenience and a potentially dangerous situation.

The leading cause of death during winter storms is auto accidents. Below are preventative tips to keep you safe on the road this winter. You may not be able to control Mother Nature but using caution and common sense can prevent an accident.

- Always know the weather before you get on the road. Remember to be extra careful when driving on bridges and overpasses; they are the first to freeze over. Be aware of black ice. Black ice occurs when the road appears to be dry but is darker and shinier than usual. Slow down when driving through these areas.
- Always Buckle Up!
- **Slow Down** (this includes turning, braking, stopping and accelerating).
- Stay Alert. Make sure you are aware of what the other drivers around you are doing.
- Stay in Control. If you do begin to fishtail, turn in the direction of the skid and make sure to keep your foot off the brake and gas petals. If you must brake on a slippery surface, be sure to pump the brakes gently unless you have ABS (Anti-lock Braking Systems). If you have ABS, press the brake firmly and hold. Do not pump the brakes if you have ABS, this will lessen the effect of your brakes.
- Avoid steep hills if possible. Use alternate routes even if they are a little longer: they may be safer.
- Keep enough distance between yourself and other cars. Slick conditions can triple the distance it takes to come to a complete stop.
- Keep your low beam headlights on...no matter what time of day it is.
