

Kayden Cotter Takes 4th Place in State Trig Star Math Competition

Kayden Cotter, a recent graduate of Beal City High School, earned 4th place honors in the 2023 Trig Star math competition in the state of Michigan this past spring. The Trig Star Program is an annual high school mathematics competition sponsored by the National Society of Professional Surveyors and the Michigan Society of Professional Surveyors based on the practical applications of trigonometry. The program recognizes the best students from high schools throughout the nation.

The purposes of the Trig Star program are to promote the study of trigonometry in high school, promote excellence by honoring the individual students who have demonstrated superior skill among classmates at the high school level, to acquaint high school trigonometry students with the use and practical application of trigonometry in the surveying profession, and to build an awareness of surveying as a profession among mathematically-skilled high school students.

The competition is a timed exercise that involves the solving of trigonometry problems, including a real-life problem mirroring typical situations that professional surveyors encounter every day. The highest score in the least amount of time is considered the winner. Kayden's score of 94% was the 4th highest score in the state.

Kayden is attending Central Michigan University this fall. 

- How can the school district complete this bond proposal without increasing the present bond millage rate of 7.00 (year)?
- upon the school district's new taxable value figure Each year the bond millage rate is recalculated based and the bond payment required in the upcoming year. Due to the repaying of prior outstanding bonds along with taxable value growth, it is estimated that the bond millage rate required to pay the existing bond payments will decline allowing this proposal to be funded without having to change the present bond millage rate of 7.00 (year). Ä
- Is the bond millage rate estimated to be the same for the entire life of the bond proposal? ö
- No, the bond millage rate is estimated to remain at 7.00 mills through 2027, thereafter it is estimated to decline due to bond repayment and taxable value growth. Ä
- Q. Does the recent windmill construction provide an opportunity for the completion of school district capital improvements without having to increase the present bond millage rate of 7.00 mills?
- Yes. The recent construction of windmills within school district boundaries has increased the taxable value available. Ä
