Winter Clothing

It's that time of year again! Now that colder temperatures have finally arrived, we wanted to remind parents of our "Seasonal Clothing" policy, in the Elementary Parent/Student Handbook. When the temperature is 41-50 degrees, coats or sweatshirts are necessary. In addition, at 40 degrees or below, boots, gloves and hats are required for all grades, and students in K-4th grade have to wear snowpants. If a student comes to school unprepared to go outside, he/she will receive a warning the first time, and remain on the blacktop. If cold weather clothing is forgotten more than one time, students will have to stand against the wall or serve lunch detention. At all times, best judgment in accordance with weather conditions is expected. Remember, it could be warm in the morning and cool off throughout the day. It's better to pack the extra winter gear than to be caught without it when the weather turns.

Career Cruising

We have exciting news at Beal City Schools! Thanks to the Beal City Education Foundation, you and your student(s) have access to three amazing tools to enhance your son or daughter's education and future.

Career Cruising is an Internet-based career exploration and planning tool that allows students to explore career and college options and develop a career plan. It can be accessed from school, from home, or wherever your son or daughter has access to the Internet. Features of the program include assessment tools to help your child identify his or her career interests, skills, abilities, and learning styles; thorough and up-to-date information about hundreds of occupations; interviews with real people in each occupation; comprehensive college and financial aid information with tools to help you and your child find the right college as well as scholarships; and advice for all stages of the job search process.

ccPathfinder enables students to build a personalized course plan, designed to help them meet graduation requirements, and put them on the right path for post-secondary and career readiness.

With ccPathfinder, students and parents can view critical information online, including student's individual course history, the school's course information, including pre-requisites, as well as graduation tracking and recommended courses.

The third component is **Method Test Prep**, an online course that helps students improve their SAT and ACT scores as well as builds their math, reading and writing skills.

Students can listen to math, verbal and writing tutorials and each tutorial is accompanied by a quiz to test student mastery. The program is highly adaptive and keeps track of a student's strengths and weaknesses. With access to a large pool of practice questions and instant feedback upon completion of each question, students can tailor their efforts to maximize their learning and increase their ACT or SAT scores. BEAL CITY FAMILY FLU CLINIC

Central Michigan District Health Department will be holding a Family Flu Clinic at Beal City High School on Wednesday, November 5th from 3:00 p.m. to 6:00 p.m. The Centers for Disease Control recommends yearly flu vaccination for everyone 6 months of age and older. Influenza disease (Flu) results in an average of 40,000 deaths and 200,000 hospitalizations every year. In addition, 20,000 children under five years of age are hospitalized in the United States every year. Infants younger than six months of age depend on vaccinated family members and care givers to protect them against flu disease, since they are too young to be vaccinated. While flu may not be a severe illness for many, some people are at higher risk for complications from the flu such as diabetics, pregnant women, children under the age of 5, persons with chronic medical conditions, and those with immune system disorders.

Central Michigan District Health Department bills private insurances, Medicare and Medicaid. For persons paying with cash, check or credit card the cost of the vaccine this year is \$45.00, but a sliding fee scale may apply that is dependent upon income and family size, thus reducing the overall cost.

So make a healthy choice this year and protect those you love and GET A FLU SHOT! In fact, bring the family and protect them all!



- Think about how you are involved or would like to be involved in your son/daughter's education, so you can discuss this with the teacher.
- Determine your son/daughter's strengths and weaknesses to share with teachers, this can help teachers understand how your student learns best.
- If you can't be at the conference, schedule a time to meet or send an email to get information about how your son/daughter is doing in each class.




School Breakfast - Good for Kids and Good for Parents!


For parents with busy schedules, it can be hard to make sure that kids are eating a healthy breakfast before they go to school in the morning.

EVEN IF YOU DON'T WANT TO PAY ON LINE it is a great way for you to keep track of purchases and balances. Where Are They Now? AJ Yuncker

In 1985, Co-Valedictorian, AJ Yuncker graduated from Beal City High School with many outstanding accomplishments. He not only had a 4.0 GPA, but placed first in the Nation in Business Math at a competition in Houston, Texas. AJ was captain of both the baseball and football teams and set school records for pull-ups (37) and sit-ups (4050). AJ said after his amazing sit-up accomplishment, "I would have done a few thousand more, but my calves cramped up." "Not sure if we had Gatorade back then."

AJ said of his experiences in Beal City, "The older I get, the more I appreciate having grown up in Beal City and going to BCHS. The combination of teachers that truly care about the students and great athletic programs are perfect for youth. I remember the name of every teacher I ever had at Beal. I honestly can only remember the name of one professor I had at the University of Michigan." He also said, "The opportunity to play multiple varsity sports on a competitive level is nothing to take for granted! In my senior year at Beal we won the 10th and 7th consecutive conference championships in football and baseball, respectively. We actually felt like failures because we didn't win state championships. It wasn't until 15 years after graduation that I began to appreciate what we actually accomplished in those two sports. When I get together with my friends from high school, we still talk about the games like it was yesterday."

After graduating from Beal City High School, AJ went on to be a 4.0 student at the University of Michigan, with 40% of his grades being A+. He graduated with a degree in Business Administration in 1989 at the age of 21. Even though he graduated Phi Beta Kappa and Beta Gamma Sigma, AJ says, "College wasn't as fun as going to high school in Beal City!"

AJ and his wife, Colleen, have two daughters – Savanna (12) and Annika (6), both of whom "have the Beal City winning spirit. Both love to win and have fun (somehow those things go together)." AJ spends most of his free-time coaching Savanna's softball team and working with both daughters in their indoor batting cages with a pitching machine.

AJ has lived in Traverse City since 1996 and in 2001 founded Natural Gas Compression Systems, of which, he is Chairman, CEO and President. NGCS fabricates, sells, leases and services the equipment that takes low pressure natural gas from wells and compresses it to the point where customers can move it through a pipeline to sell. It is headquartered in Traverse City, they fabricate equipment in Traverse City and have rental and field service operations in 15 states. They are now the 6th largest company in the world that does what they do and the 2nd largest privately held company in the world that is in their business. AJ says of his company, "we are a very capital intensive business, so we needed to raise a few million dollars to be viable. I have 44 original shareholders that founded NGCS. They have received more than 13 times their original investment and still have their ownership in the company. I am very proud of NGCS's success for our employees and shareholders. However, I am more proud of being a Beal City Aggie than anything else in my life!" –Go Blue

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5 Key Tips to Avoid Being a Bully Bystander.



1. Be a Friend.

Sometimes **simply being nice to someone who is being bullied is helpful**. Letting them know that you do not agree with it and asking if there is anything you can do lets them know that someone cares. Encouraging them to,

2. Talk to an adult.

Talk to an adult is also being a friend. If this is not something that they feel comfortable with then as a friend you should **find** an adult you trust to handle the situation before it gets worse. If there is no adult around and the situation seems to escalate then you can,

3. Assist with an Escape.

Create a distraction so that the attention is off of the bully. **If the bully doesn't have the needed audience then there's no reason to go on**. Only intervene on bullying situations when it is safe to do so. And do not intervene through the use of violence. This only escalates the situation and a bystander should be able to,

4. Set a Good Example.

Be a leader to those around you. Encourage them about the negative effects of bullying and actively participate in antibullying projects and initiatives. **Promote the motto of respecting individuality and giving awareness to cultivating a bullyFREE culture.** And again, the number one thing you can do to prevent being a Bully Bystander is

5. Don't Be an Audience.

Prevent the fire before it starts.
